FROM THE REVD PAUL CAWTHORNE

'Who is my neighbour; how is my neighbour?'

As spring gets underway and the crops grow rapidly in our fields, we are reminded of how fortunate we are to live in such a beautiful area of God's world. As Lenten reflectiveness turns into Easter joys, we enter a season of growth and full of promise.

This year it is tinged for me with thoughts stimulated by the lawyer's penetrating question to Jesus: 'Who is my neighbour?' (Luke 10:29) which leads to Jesus telling the parable of the Good Samaritan. We hear in the news from East Africa about the way the drought from the last two years' El Nino cycle is exacerbating underlying food security problems. It makes us wonder whether we should be trying to help or just regarding that as reportage from a far-distant 'other' place with which we have no connection. Reading about attacks on those who have left places of difficulty to come here brings home to us that Jesus' parable has strong relevance. Jesus reminds us that it is often the person who is not at the centre of their society who is more open to assisting the sufferer and gently challenges us to think what we can or should do to help.

These challenges can feed our spiritual imagination as we face into the complex and thorny questions about housing. As plans seem to expand for new groups of houses at Chalgrove, Sandford parish, Berinsfield village and more, what priorities come to the fore? Our instinctive defensive responses need to be recognised and then held up for scrutiny by our consciences in the light of Jesus' teaching. There are a number of overlapping and often contradictory imperatives which need to be carefully weighed up. Protecting the greenbelt which has served us well against ribbon development; providing lower cost housing low-paid workers can afford seems sensible. Lower capital market returns and tax breaks have encouraged people to buy extra houses to make money through rent rather than just for their own housing needs, inflating prices. The country's population is increasing and creating fresh requirements. Living standards have increased through the post-war period and expectation of house size remains high. So many angles. There are very capable and well-intentioned people whose main job is to look into these issues and consider infrastructure, traffic, landscape and all the myriad of associated matters. We hold them in prayer as the discussions unfold through democratic processes of transparency and accountability.

Do we think of new housing plans as containing potential new neighbours whom we may be able to meet and get to know or as a mythical 'other', just as emotionally distant from us as the hungry of South Sudan? That is not trying to make a case or provide easy answers. Many of us value unbuilt landscape and a sense of peace profoundly - perhaps as profoundly as those who crave more of both from situations of rupture. It can be easier to try to dissociate than to take up Jesus' challenge to see ourselves as all part of one world full of interconnections. It takes

emotional engagement to unpack of course, but surely better to try to keep an open heart, to chip in than to tune out?

BORDERING ON INSANITY – CREATING AN ALL-YEAR-ROUND BORDER

At the April meeting of the Wallingford Gardening Club, Timothy Walker will talk about 'Bordering on Insanity - creating an all-year-round border'. This is the Club's prestigious annual 'Bill Baker Memorial Lecture'.



This talk looks exclusively at the herbaceous border in Timothy's wife's garden and covers the principles and practicalities to be adopted when trying to create a border that is interesting all-year-round. It concludes with a look at a collection of must-have plants for such a border.

From 1986 to 2014 Timothy worked at the University of Oxford Botanic Garden & Harcourt Arboretum (OBGHA), firstly as General Foreman, and finally as Director. Between 1992 and 2000 the OBGHA won 4 gold, 2 silver-gilt, and one silver medal at the Chelsea Flower Show London. Since 1986 he has given more than 1500 talks to more than 100,000 people in gardening clubs and horticultural societies!

BALDONS GIRLS WIN SOUTH OXFORDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL YOUNG ACHIEVER AWARDS

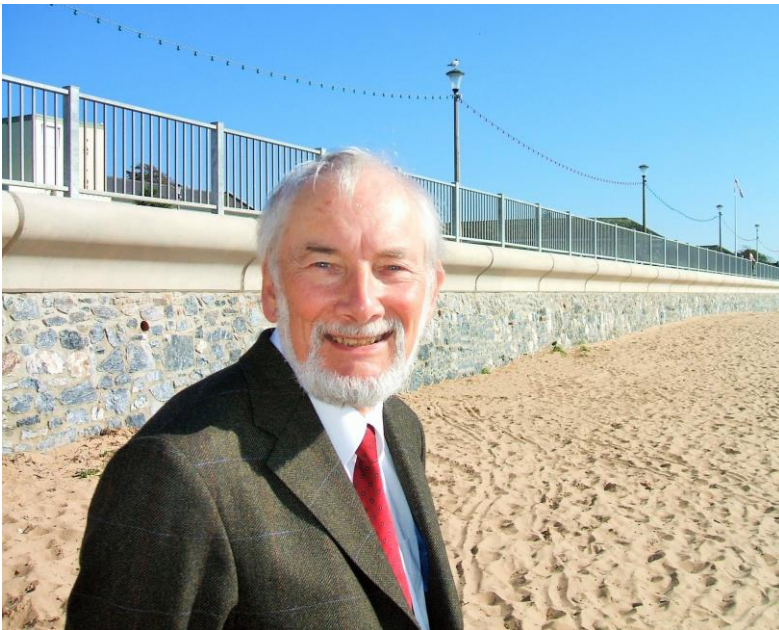
South Oxfordshire District Council developed the Young Achiever scheme to recognise young people who make that extra contribution to help their community or dedicate themselves to a sport or the arts.

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Neighbourhood plan

Work continues on developing the neighbourhood plan. In order for the plan to be robust and meet the necessary criteria set by SODC an additional landscape assessment is being undertaken. When this is complete it is anticipated that a draft plan will be in place by the early summer with consultation with villagers occurring shortly after. More information will be in next month's newsletter but also available for discussion at the Annual Parishes meeting on 10th April.

Better Oxfordshire

Proposals for Unitary Status in Local government in Oxfordshire

Villagers will have read or heard in local media about the proposed changes in local government. Oxfordshire County Council, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils have worked together to develop a joint proposal for a new single unitary council for Oxfordshire. Entitled *A New Council For A Better Oxfordshire*, the joint proposal combines the best ideas and feedback from local councils, residents, businesses, partners, and the wider Oxfordshire community into a final proposal to be submitted to government in March 2017.

It makes the case for abolishing the existing two-tier structure of 4 District Councils Oxford City Council and the County Council in favour of a single unitary authority. It proposes a single council for Oxfordshire which would be responsible for delivering all local services across the county, enabling it to make substantial savings, whilst improving outcomes for residents, giving them a say in the future of their city, towns and parishes, and working better with partners.

The proposal includes the creation of number area executive boards at local level to deal with local issues on which parish councils could be represented. There would be fewer councillors in total (both district and county) than at present but who would represent their community at both county and area board level.

These proposals, which don't have the support of other district councils, have been subject to some public consultation and are to be submitted to government for consideration and possible approval. These changes would have considerable implications for local democracy and the role of parish councils and local representation.

There was a substantial discussion at the parish council meeting on 13th March and councillors raised many questions with our district and county councillors about the proposals and feel there is need for more information and detail before we can say we support them but we would encourage villagers to read more of the plans which can be found on line at

It will be up to Government to determine whether the proposals can go ahead be amended or rejected and we won't know more until after the OCC elections in May. At the Annual Parish Meeting on April 10th we can hold discussions on the issues and hope that villagers will be interested in being more informed as there is likely to be more public consultation if the plans go ahead. Do come along.

Planning applications

1 The Croft. The council considered and agreed to indicate support to SODC for an application for a 2 storey front and side extension.

Parsonage Farm. SODC planning committee has approved the plans for a house on the site of the old Poultry building.

Other planning applications recently approved by SODC include: Thurlfield Cottage extension, 33 The Green extension, Harcourt Arboretum plant propagation unit, Hillfield Farm Permitted Development.

Village Green

As spring comes upon us again and lawns and gardens are tidied up it's appropriate to remind residents round the green to not use the green for the disposal of grass cuttings and garden waste. Farmers and land owners who have the right to take the hay off the green express concern at the damage that can be done to the grass. If you have difficulty disposing of garden waste please obtain a garden waste bin from SODC.

Residents round the green were also circulated recently with a statement by Savills on one aspect of the rules of the Green. The full statement of the rules of the village green and what activities are not permitted is on the large notice board near the cricket pavilion. If you are a new resident in the village please find time to read it.

South Oxfordshire Local Plan - Second Preferred Options consultation

South Oxfordshire District Council (SODC) would like your help to plan for how they deal with the need for new houses and employment in South Oxfordshire.

They will shortly publish the latest draft of their new Local Plan which explains where, and why, they consider new houses and employment should be located up until the year 2033. It also explains how they will raise money to provide infrastructure for things like roads, schools, leisure centres, parks and shops.

Public consultation

You can read the draft Local Plan on the council's website from Wednesday 29 March at www.southoxon.gov.uk/localplan. You'll also be able to find out more information about the plan, including details on how to provide your feedback. Paper copies of the plan will be available at libraries across the district as well as at SODC's office during usual opening hours.

The Local Plan will be available for you to comment on for seven weeks until 17 May 2017 – the standard consultation period has been extended by one week to allow for the Easter holiday. SODC is also holding some drop-in events where you can come and view the plans for yourselves and ask any questions you might have.

POWER CUT ADVICE FROM UK POWER NETWORKS

Our electricity network is built to be resilient but extreme weather can damage overhead power lines resulting in some customers losing their electricity supply. Where this happens we work to restore power as quickly and safely as possible, and we have organised for additional staff in our contact centre and more engineers on the ground to be available to help customers whose electricity supply might be affected. You will be able to find regular updates on our website www.ukpowernetworks.co.uk and social media @ukpowernetworks throughout this period.

Anyone experiencing a power cut should:

- Call **105** to report power cuts and damage to the electricity network
- Visit www.ukpowernetworks.co.uk for the latest update
- Visit www.ukpowernetworks.co.uk/powercut and type in their postcode to view our live power cut map
- Tweet @ukpowernetworks to report a power cuts or to receive updates

UK Power Networks has a **Priority Service Register** for customers who may be more vulnerable and require extra assistance in a power cut. You can find out more information on our website: ukpowernetworks.co.uk/priority.

We advise people to stay clear of power lines and report damaged power lines immediately by calling **105** - free to call from a landline or a mobile phone. If they see electricity lines that are down or causing significant risk to the public they should call 999.

Below is some additional advice on how you can prepare for a power cut:

- Keep our freephone number handy
- See the website for some useful videos offering you advice during a power cut.
- Keep spare batteries for radios and torches – local radio stations often broadcast helpful information
- Keep an old-fashioned corded phone which you can plug in, as cordless phones won't work in the event of a power cut
- Take care if using candles, tea-lights and other naked flames
- Keep fridges and freezers closed, with a blanket over as they will stay cold for many hours
- Switch off all your electrical equipment, except one light which will let you know when the power comes back on
- Remember the street lights may also be off so take care if you go out
- Look out for elderly neighbours and other vulnerable people; please consider taking them round a flask of hot water or hot food

FROM JOHN HOWELL MP

In addition to the national and international issues hitting headlines of late there have been some important local issues raised with me. This month I would like to focus on these.

A number of constituents across the area have contacted me about school funding and I fully appreciate the concerns. Funding for schools in the constituency has been an issue that I have pursued on behalf of the schools over some time. In the last couple of years I have supported the F40 fair funding campaign, I have petitioned parliament, I have arranged meetings with local school heads with fellow MPs and have myself raised the issues with Ministers. On this latest issue I am personally meeting with the Secretary of State to discuss the situation with her. At the time of writing this meeting has not taken place. I will report back on my website for those interested in following up.

In a meeting with local farmers the issue of hare coursing and rural crime has again come to the fore with a surge of activity in recent months. We have discussed this with the Police and I am pleased with the action they propose to take. I also raised the issue in the House of Commons during debate this month to draw attention to the fact that whilst farmers can dig ditches and barricade their fences, many are reluctant to do so for fear of retaliation. My principal concern is the threat that hare coursing poses to farming communities. I am pleased to have had confirmation from the Local Police Superintendent that this is a priority on which they are working on behalf of our farmers.

The state of our roads is another hot topic and thus I am pleased that local road-users will benefit in 2017/18 from a dedicated £1,315,000 pothole fund. This cash is part of a £1.2 billion fund for local roads that is being allocated to councils to repair and rebuild transport links. There is more good news too with an award of £239,000 from the Department for Transport to Oxfordshire for schemes to improve road journeys with a focus on users suffering with some form of disability.
