These events do not happen by chance and without a lot of hard work by a number of people and the Baldons Events Committee (BEC) would like to offer a huge thank you to all those villagers that gave up their time to help with marquees, car parking, the bar and all those other little things that make the event such a success. We would also like to offer a special thank you to Martin Delafield for his never ceasing efforts in keeping the bonfire together through the preceding week...and for actually lighting it!!

BEC exists for 2 reasons:

- To organise social events in the Community for the Community
- To provide appropriate donations toward worthy Village causes

The Village Fireworks event is a critical part of the BEC calendar in that it is the only event that normally provides a surplus and thus allows us to deliver those additional events and donations for the Community. We thought it worth taking a couple of paragraphs to try to explain a little more of what we do.

The Firework event allows us to subsidise Lunch on the Green, the Ball or the Barn Dance. It also provides for the Xmas Tree on the Green and presents for the children. And since BEC was formed, over £4,000 has been donated to various Village organisations including the Churches, Youth Club, Hand Bells, Baldon Players, Village Halls, Seven Stars and the Lunch Club.

Over the years, BEC has also invested significant monies in the purchase and maintenance of an amount of capital equipment - namely marquees, tables and various other paraphernalia that provides the infrastructure for events such as The Feast to take place in the village. This equipment is also often hired out at preferential rates to Villagers and should BEC ever be disbanded, this equipment, which is stored on the Village Hall premises, would belong to the Community. BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Planning applications

Two planning applications have been received and commented on by the council.

46 The Green: an application for a rear extension on this listed building was supported and has subsequently been granted planning consent by SODC.

College Farm House: This application was for retrospective approval of an open fronted shed which had been built not in accordance with the original SODC planning consent or its related conditions being applied with. The parish council had supported the original application but reflected concerns about the new application to SODC. A decision is still awaited from SODC.

Village pond

Those of you who walk round the green or come to the school will, we hope, have noticed the pruning of the willows and cutting back of brambles etc. which has taken place round the pond near the school The area was beginning to look overgrown and is now more open and attractive and will look even better as the pond fills during the winter months The work has been done voluntarily by Paul Cawthorne with a bit of help from others; an excellent bit of voluntary community action for which we are very grateful.

Baldon Feast

Councillors were delighted to hear from Ralph Slaney that the Baldon Feast is secure for 2015, and that following a very successful meeting he had held in early November a steering committee has been formed. So thank you to everyone who has volunteered to be involved and help in various ways. We look forward to another great event in August. Ralph will be putting more information in the newsletter.

Bonfire

Another very successful bonfire night was held on 1st November, thanks to the hard work of Baldons Events Committee members.

Winter Flooding Problems

As in most winters we will get some flooding occurring, hopefully not in houses but on roads and in ditches which create problems for a few days.

Land owners and householders who have a ditch or culvert on or outside their property have a riparian responsibility for ensuring that water flows easily off the road or land and into the ditches and along the drainage channels without obstruction. Blockages and obstruction either from plant life or rubbish can cause flooding and a problem for others. SODC and OCC and environmental services urge communities and property and land owners to do all they can to help reduce the likelihood of problems.

The Parish Council maintains the main ditches on the village green but would householders please help and check that ditches on or adjoining your land are free flowing and clear of obstructions.

If road drains become blocked they should be reported to the Highways Dept. for clearing. But it helps if the surfaces of drains are kept clear of grass cuttings and waste. If you have road drains outside your property please try and help to keep them clear, and check them if they are draining slowly.

Baldon Lane Pumping station

New pumps are being installed by Thames Water in this pumping station during November which it is hoped will resolve the long standing flooding problems in Baldon Lane. The situation will be monitored and any continuing problems referred back to Thames Water.

Toot Baldon Mains drainage

The council received an update on the discussion with Thames Water on mains drainage Progress has been slow with the holiday period. Contact has been made with the Environment Agency and Thames Water to locate monitoring and test results carried out around 2006 – nothing has come to light yet, but EA are trying their offsite storage facility. A questionnaire will be sent to all Toot residents shortly and, hopefully, the formal application will be submitted to Thames Water before Christmas.

Village web site

The Baldons Community web site is in the process of being changed to a new host, www.parishcouncil.net. This is an organisation which provides websites to parish councils all over the country, and has a good track record. The new site is set up and being tested at the time of writing and it will be live in the near future. It will still be reachable via the same address, www.baldons.org.uk. More information will be in a subsequent newsletter but if you use the current website you will notice the change when it happens. Further information from Peter Burke, peterdavidburke@gmail.com. SODC Voter Registration update

SODC have informed parish councils that the next phase of completing the new electoral register will happen in the next few weeks and may have been completed before the end of November. Letters will be sent out to residents confirming their inclusion on the new register. The only action that may be required is for individuals to decide whether to opt in or out of the open register and this can be done by phone. All the necessary explanation will be in the letter.

WINTER LOOMS

As we face winter and all she brings, I always like to look back at what autumn offered us

Rich earth tone colours, falling leaves, everything preparing to take a well-deserved rest over the winter. Migrants from north, leaves turning falling, fungi. A season of mists and mellow fruitfulness - beautiful colours signalling the coming winter and end of year - harvest. Crunchy leaves conkers and new school uniforms. Bejeweled cobwebs glittering in the autumn sun after a frost or a mist.

These are just some of the descriptive terms you have mentioned to me. What about winter though, what to you reflects the winter season?

Plenty to do out in the wildlife garden in winter though. Fruit trees and hedges to be pruned, but don't overdo it, leave some to berry to provide food and shelter. The prunings can be turned into stick piles and used to thicken up the bases of hedges as well. It's a great season in which you may have the time to consider some big projects - digging a pond, for example, making some new wildlife nestboxes or digging out a new flowerbed.

What the wildlife wants at this time of year though is food, water and shelter, so don't be tidying everything away or raking up every leaf in sight. Under a layer of leaves can be a degree or two warmer so that's where much of the wildlife could be. Garden by all means but care needs to be taken to avoid wholesale destruction. It won't just be hedgehogs hibernating under those leaves under your hedge.

The world won't come to an end if those leaves stay there, will it?
