

FROM REVD CAROLINE KING, TEAM VICAR FOR STADHAMPTON, NEWINGTON AND WARBOROUGH

February is a short but pivotal month; in the church, we transition from the season of Christmas and look towards Lent, Holy Week and Easter. February begins with the Feast of Candlemas on 2nd February, which is forty days after Christmas. It is the last of the church's Christmas celebrations and the final mention of the infant Jesus in the bible.

The date for Candlemas is significant; 2nd February is forty days after Christmas and lies exactly half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, so it marks the day upon which winter is half over. On the 2nd February winter is half over and we can truly look forward to signs of spring.

The passage in Luke 2:22-40 is one of the most beautiful and haunting passages in the bible. In it God speaks through Anna and Simeon. Sometimes God speaks to us through surprising people. Anna was an 84-year-old widow, yet she could see the potential wrapped up in the tiny helpless child. She could see the man he would become. Simeon could see too that this child was a light to lighten the world. Simeon took Jesus into his arms and said the words which are well known because they have come down to us as the Nunc dimittis. He was saying to God that he could now die happily because he had seen the Saviour. These are the words as found in the *Book of Common Prayer*, 1662):

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word. For mine eyes have seen: thy salvation,

Which thou hast prepared: before the face of all people;

To be a light to lighten the Gentiles: and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

It is better to light a candle than to stumble in the dark. Candles are an important part of our worship especially during the Christmas season but we must remember that Jesus the light of the world is for all times and all places, not just this time of year. We are called to see that the light of the love of God shining in our parishes throughout the year.

For me one of the most hopeful signs of spring are the snowdrops which even now are just beginning to poke through. They are so delicate, so simple, so pure, a little sign that lighter days and the colours and blossom of spring is on the way. As we move from the celebrations of Christmas to observing Lent I find the poem below speaks to me in many ways:-

Into a dark world a snowdrop comes, a benison of hope and peace, carrying within it a green heart, symbol of God's renewing love. Come to inhabit our darkness Lord Christ, for dark and light are alike to you.

May nature's white candles of hope remind us of your radiance and light our journey through Spring, and beyond. (Kate Mcllhagga, Iona Community)

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Welcome to 2018 and a late Happy New Year from the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood plan.

At last the Baldons Neighbourhood Plan is nearing completion and following the inclusion of some amendments and clarifications arising from comments made during the period of consultations it is expected, at the time of writing, that the document will have been submitted to SODC by the beginning of February.

Planning applications

New Farm House, Toot Baldon: P17/S3706/FUL. This application for a 2 storey extension and conversion of garage to a separate annexe has been withdrawn prior to SODC decision.

- 4 Baldon Lane, Marsh Baldon: P17/S4425/HH. An application for a 2 storey side extension to provide integral garage and additional bedroom. The Parish Council has agreed to support this application.
- 31 Toot Baldon: P17/S3448/HH. An application for a single storey side extension to provide additional bedroom and ensuite The Parish Council has agreed to support this application.
- 32 The Green MB P17/S4051/FUL An application for change of use of land from agricultural to garden status. Supported by Parish Council.
- 44 The Green MB P17/4270/HH an application for a flat roof single storey rear extension. The Parish Council has agreed to support this application.

Village Green

Villagers and councillors have become increasingly concerned at the deteriorating condition of the edges of village green arising from parking and inappropriate driving in the vicinity of the school and on the south side. Some of the latter being attributable to pub parking and the condition of the track.

After a long discussion at the council meeting there is agreement to a broad strategy to achieve repairs recognising that this will require much more discussion with stakeholders, land owners and villagers to gain support and funding which is not the responsibility of the Parish Council and is beyond its means.

The council has agreed that the priority for 2018 is to improve conditions outside the school and have agreed to progress discussion with the school governors and other stakeholders to reach agreement on the way forward and means of funding. Estimates for work will be obtained and progress discussed at the council meeting in March.

The council have also agreed to fund a 'No Driving on the Village Green' notice which will be installed on the south side.

Finances and Precept for 2018/9

Following consideration of our balances and the expenditure anticipated for next financial year the council is asking SODC for an inflation increase of 3% on the precept.

Village Spring Clean day Sunday April 8th

This is an early warning of our annual village spring clean. Please put the date in you diary and try an come and help. More info in next month's newsletter.

Oxford to Cambridge Expressway

Three members of the Expressway action group attended a stakeholder meeting with the Highways England and gave a presentation of the objections and issues of importance to South Oxfordshire communities. A further meeting is expected to be held in the New Year. It is expected that recommendations on the route will be made in the summer of 2018 In addition, lobbying of the county council has resulted in a vote requiring the OCC to demand that the government undertake a public enquiry.

Baldon Web Site

The web site has been updated and now displays minutes and agendas of Parish council meetings from 2013. Other parish council information will gradually be added to comply with the requirement for greater transparency.

FIBRE BROADBAND UPDATE report from our County Councillor

This update covers the following areas: **Toot Baldon, Marsh Baldon**, Garsington, Stadhampton, **Nuneham Courtenay**, Clifton Hampden, Culham and Dorchester.

The superfast broadband infrastructure upgrade scheduled for your location has moved from being expected to complete this December, to the first half of 2018. OCC understands this is likely to be very disappointing, and the council wishes to reassure everyone affected that all effort is being made to have this work completed as soon as possible. For context, the programme has achieved it's 95% coverage target on time, but as part of a major infrastructure project which has delivered over 73,000 premises with access to superfast broadband, there are some instances where mostly engineering related challenges have not been overcome in time for completion by December. These instances are normally

related to gaining access wayleaves, high cost structures needing re-planning, collapsed ducts requiring new track (with commensurate traffic management notice periods), or in some cases a technology change where we are not confident the proposed new technologies such as Fibre to the Remote Node, will be properly deployed.

FROM JOHN HOWELL MP

In a constituency that stretches from the edge of Reading to the south and the edge of Bicester to the north, and from the River Thames to the West and the Buchinghamshire border to the east there are often relatively local issues that do not immediately affect the whole constituency – although there may be implications on a wider scale.

In the middle of the constituency concern has been raised over the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Expressway as there has been suggestion of a route which cuts through the Green Belt around Oxford. Although roads are permitted in the Green Belt, this new road would need to be funded with substantial housing development which is neither appropriate or permitted under normal Green Belt regulation. In my view such a route is entirely unnecessary and not the most practical. A key area for growth is the Oxford – Milton Keynes - Cambridge arc and such a road would need to include Milton Keynes in the link. I have made my views known to the Secretary of State for Transport. I have also called for full public consultation on this project which so far has not been included in the National Infrastructure Commission proposals. A project of this magnitude must be open to public scrutiny.
