FROM THE VICAR, REVD PAUL CAWTHORNE

CITIZENS ADVICE PUTS PENSION OPTIONS IN YOUR HANDS

Question:

I've heard that the new pension reforms say I will have full access to my pension pot when I turn 55. How do I work out what I should do with my pension savings?

Answer:

The pension reforms that came in this April give people the freedom to access their defined contribution pension and do whatever they want with it. You can buy an annuity, or take your pension out in one go, or withdraw it bit by bit and leave some of it invested.

Planning for your retirement can be complicated so it's important to get guidance on your options.

The good news is that the Government has introduced Pension Wise, a new free service offering guidance online, over the phone with The Pensions Advisory Service, or face to face with Citizens Advice. Appointments are pre-booked 45-minute sessions tailored to your individual circumstances. Guidance is impartial, meaning that it will not recommend products or services, but the person you talk to will describe your options and help you consider their impact.

To get the most out of Pension Wise guidance, preparation is important. First, work out the value of your pension pots. Look at your most recent statement or contact your provider. Check and see if there are any restrictions attached. Next, get a state pension forecast, and gather the details of any benefits you receive.

The next step is to work out your likely expenditure. Include the cost of essentials like housing or utilities, and leisure activities. This should give you a rough budget. Bring this information to your Pension Wise appointment. Citizens Advice staff will help you think through your circumstances and present the options available to you.

FLASHY BROADBAND DEALS LURE CUSTOMERS INTO PRICE TRAP

Price promises made by broadband providers are misleading customers and costing them up to six times more than advertisements imply.

New research from Citizens Advice finds that many broadband advertisements draw customers in with attractive discounted "teaser deals" which last for a limited period and mask the real long-term costs. Because of hidden charges such as line rental, starter fees and delivery costs, on average monthly costs are over three times the initial price advertised.

Citizens Advice analysed advertisements from the six main broadband providers. Over the promotional period, broadband was advertised as costing from zero up to £20 per month, but the full cost after the promotional period ended ranged from £20 to £45 per month. Line rental can add as much as £16.99 to the advertised monthly fee, making it the most expensive additional cost.

One offer for broadband at £9.95 for 6 months worked out as £35.79 per month, once installation fees and line rental were factored in. Over the duration of the contract the customer will have paid £465 more than the advertisement suggests. Misleading broadband advertisements can make it harder for consumers to shop around to get the best deal. Citizens Advice is calling on broadband providers to be forthcoming about the price that consumers will actually pay, and is asking the Advertising Standards Authority to introduce new rules ensuring that broadband deals are transparent.

Before taking out a new contract, customers are advised to ask their supplier for the average monthly cost over the full contract period, not just the promotional period.

Locally, a project called "Better Broadband for Oxfordshire" aims to bring fibre broadband to over 90% of homes and businesses in the county by the end of 2015. The project, a collaboration between Oxfordshire County Council, BT and BDUK, will bring significant social and economic benefits to rural areas where broadband access may currently be slow.

From the Interim Governing Body, Marsh Baldon School

Dear Pupils, Staff, Parents, Carers and members of the wider community,

As some of you may know, during the summer holidays the Department for Education (DfE) approved the formation of the Interim Executive Board (IEB). This was proposed to the DfE by the Local Authority in order to provide a temporary substitute to a Governing Body, with a future aim to reinstate normal governance arrangements. On the 16th September 2015 the IEB held their first formal meeting of the term. This meeting had three core areas of focus:

1. Ensuring that all statutory requirements are in place (including governance)

- Governors are pleased to confirm that all statutory requirements are now firmly in place, this will provide the foundation for effective governance of the school now and in the longer term.

2. Learning and Teaching

- At the meeting the governors were keen to thank Mrs Herring and her staff for their positive attitude to the changes which are needed in school and their hard work during the holidays in preparing for the new term - especially Mrs Herring who spent a large amount of the summer working in school.
- Governors agreed the school improvement plan, the need for rapid improvement and offered full support to Mrs Herring in implementing this quickly.
- Governors felt that we are prepared for our OFSTED visit - which could happen any time now.

3. Community engagement

It was confirmed to all governors that Mrs Herring and Mr Moyes recently met with Mrs Tonge - Chair of the Parish Council, in order to start an ongoing positive relationship which will enable us to work together on school and wider community issues.

Mrs Herring also confirmed to governors that she has recently met with the Vicar and Team from St Peter's church with the same aim as above.

It was also confirmed at the meeting that a new school website is under development with a planned launch date of next week. The new site will be much clearer, easier to use and will include all key information such as school policies, IEB minutes, and other documents linked to governance.

At the meeting we discussed ways in which we can strengthen the links formally between the IEB and the parent/carer community - more will follow on this shortly.

We also, of course, had the community session next week on 21st September 2015 and we were pleased to see many of you there. This was a great opportunity to receive further updates, to discuss any matters with us and to enable you to play an active part in the review/development of our school aims, vision and ethos.

I will continue to provide a written update after each IEB meeting as above and will where needed, submit additional entries to the school and parish newsletters. However, your main point of information on governance should be the school website.

WHAT MY DNA TEST TOLD ME! FRIDAY 9TH OCTOBER

Writer and historian Tony Hadland, based in Oxfordshire, returns to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society with a further talk ... "What my DNA test told me!"



After years of wondering whether it was worthwhile, Tony took a comprehensive DNA test. His aim was to prove (or disprove) a family tradition that his great-grandmother, Mildred Gill, was of Spanish descent. The test confirmed a cover-up going back several generations, but also threw up fascinating information about his Oxfordshire agricultural labourer ancestors, possibly linking them to the spread of agriculture from the Fertile Crescent.

Tony is a Fellow of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors; a historian specialising in local, family, recusant and cycle history; honorary president of the Moulton Bicycle Club; and chairman of the Oxfordshire Local History Association. He has made numerous appearances on radio, particularly in recent years on BBC Radio Oxford, and has also appeared in documentary films and on regional TV. This talk will be held on Friday 9th Oct, 7.45 for 8pm, at Wallingford Town Hall. Visitors (£3) are most welcome.

CASTLES OF THE THAMES VALLEY: NEW RESEARCH CONFERENCE

The most recent research on Wallingford's history will be made public at this sixth conference organised by The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) in conjunction with Wallingford Museum.

The last eight years have seen major advances in understanding the importance of Wallingford's role as a royal Saxon and Medieval stronghold. TWHAS has undertaken new documentary research, as well as being actively involved in the Burh to Borough Project, led by the Universities of Leicester, Exeter and Oxford, including taking over completion of the project's Urban Test Pitting programme. A new publication with the latest research will be available at the conference: Wallingford: the Castle and Town in Context.

The latest documentary work has finally revealed Wallingford Castle in its rightful place among the great royal castles of the Thames Valley, so TWHAS are delighted to have brought together a group of eminent speakers, each of whom has been involved in new research concerning these significant royal strongholds.

The conference will be held at the Methodist Church Centre, St Leonard's Square, Wallingford on **Saturday 24 October, from 9.45am to 5pm**. For anyone wishing to visit the site of Wallingford Castle there will be a brief guided tour led by Judy Dewey. The event's cost is £30 per person - this includes a buffet lunch, and refreshments during the day. Advance booking will be essential ! Booking forms are available from Wallingford Museum.

TAPPING INTO OUR SENSES OUT IN THE WILDLIFE GARDEN

Life has been challenging for me over the last few years with debilitating Rheumatoid Arthritis, which at times has incapacitated me. Traditional and alternative medications have been sourced, but a suitable treatment programme was a struggle to find. In 2014, amidst intense pain I discovered nature sensory connections really began to help get on top of my pain management. Agreed, my mobility is still dire, but we're getting there.

I thought I'd write briefly about my findings and experience this month. That way, you can explore, think about and maybe get even more benefit from your wildlife gardens.

Let me start by saying I visualize my pain as a white pulsing orb. The pulses are the pain. I've been trying to think past the pain for a while now, trying to extend the gaps between those pulses of pain. I meditate and I've used hypnotherapy to turn down pain in my head. When I discovered nature sensory engagement I really started to master this pain thing. I've been a wildlife watcher for most of my life and last year started using those skills in a new way to try and manage my pain.

From our five main senses of sight, sound, touch, taste and smell, let's look at sight first. Nip outside and have a look at your wildlife garden. Don't look intently, rest your eyes on the landscape and use your peripheral vision. Slowly begin to notice how many more shades of green you can see, and the little subtle movements that you miss if you look to intently at a spot. This is what good birdwatcher does, resting their eyes on a space where they know there's a bird but can't locate it, by using their peripheral vision they can quickly locate what they are looking for.

Now do the same with your ears. Notice in a jungle soundscape how all the creatures inhabit a differing sound frequency, some over lapping but all audible. We humans talk over one another, and our message can be lost in the hubbub. Out in your garden, rest your ears on the soundscape around you, by listening to less note how you hear more. If there is an annoying sound in that soundscape, try and filter that out. Equate that annoyance as how I see my pain, something that we just let do its thing but just filter out.

Notice how the soundscape around you has differing frequencies, ebbing and flowing. Even if you are in a busy city, try and conduct that sound like an orchestra. Notice how the cacophony is made up of differing sounds, ebbing and flowing and overlapping. Try and break the soundscape down. Maybe try drawing what the differing sounds may look like, draw how they make you feel.

Continue this exercise with your senses of taste, touch and smell. This can be done anywhere, and notice how the mind is distracted away from the stress, pain or challenges it may be dealing with.

What I do is try to fill those gaps between the pulses of pain with nature and my sensory connection to it.

Have a go, maybe adapt my theory to tap into your own wellbeing, but if nothing else, use this idea to maybe get even more pleasure from your own wildlife garden. Beginning to maybe sense things you have been walking past on a daily basis and taking for granted.

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

It was refreshing to have more villagers than usual at our council meeting on 8th September. It is encouraging that some of you take an interest in the issues we are considering and it allows us to get some feedback before we take decisions that affect the village. Please come more often.

Speeding through the village

We have been asked to look again at the problem of cars and other vehicles speeding through the village in ways that are potentially unsafe for pedestrians given the narrowness of roads and lack of pavement. This has been an ongoing problem particularly in The Croft which we have raised with Highways department many times in the past few years.

We have a 30 mph speed limit through the village but on some stretches of the road this is far too fast. However it is unlikely that the highways dept. would support a reduction in this limit on current evidence. Our County Councillor Lorraine Lindsey Gale has agreed to request that OCC undertake a speed survey so we await information about that. *What we do ask is that villagers who are the greatest users of our roads take more care and go slower particularly through the narrow stretches and the bends.* It will only take one accident to a child or elderly person!!

Subsidised bus services

As we outlined last month there is a danger that the Baldons will lose the current limited bus service as a result of the OCC plans for savings. Parish Councillors have supported a proposal prepared for us by Ralph Slaney to argue for a more frequent and daily service by an adjustment of the route of the T2 service and have responded to OCC with a detailed proposal. Much will depend on whether Thames Travel will be able to support it and agree to its feasibility in service and financial terms and whether it will be supported by the County Council should it need a subsidy. An initial approach has been made to Thames Travel to begin discussions with them on this option. However if we are to be successful it will be important to be able to demonstrate to the OCC and Thames Travel that the service will be well used.

Parking and driving near the pub

The parish council has some concern at the volume of cars driving and parking on the green outside the pub and are considering whether we can find a way to manage the situation a little better and minimise the damage and erosion to the edges of the green without causing problems for our community owned and highly popular pub. We are hoping that in discussion with BNCS Committee we can find a way to improve the situation over the next few months. If you have views about the situation and what we might do, let us know what you think.

Linked with this is the current state of the unadopted track on the south side of the green which has deteriorated in recent months. The unadopted tracks round the green in Marsh Baldon are not maintained by the Highways department or the Parish Council but are the responsibility of land owners and householders to organise, fund and deal with repairs.

Neighbourhood plan

Councillors have now agreed to recommend to the village that we undertake a neighbourhood plan which has to have the support of the village before we can ask SODC for their support. A consultation document will shortly be sent to every household explaining what it is about and why we feel it is important and asking for you to respond indicating your support or otherwise. Lead parish councillors are Elizabeth Gillespie, Stephen Dance and Laurence Attewill.

Oxford Lodge Harcourt Arboretum P15/S2717/LB listed building consent for installation of computer network cabling.

Court House Toot Baldon P15/S 2916 Application for conversion of a barn to create a residential annexe to Court House
